Hello! I do hope this newsletter finds you well. As the season changes to autumn and we begin to reflect on the year, although not quite back to normal. We did manage to do quite a lot in the east! The Eastern Region has had a fairly busy summer with events including training days in both Hertfordshire and Suffolk as well as a long rein/drive event earlier in the season in Cambridgeshire. These events were amazingly well supported by members from across our large region as well as by those travelling across regional borders to come and join in! It's been so lovely to see some familiar faces as well as many new ones and people really enjoying getting back out with their donkeys.

The Eastern region had a great day out at the Gransden Show in Cambridgeshire with many members of the public enquiring about donkeys and what we do with them, as well as many non-members telling us about their donkeys and what they get up to. We put on a display in the main ring with members from across our region (and others) demonstrating, long reining, driving, pack work including a variety of standard as well as miniature donkeys.

Unfortunately The Eastern Region Autumn Donkey Show (ERADS) was sadly cancelled due to the fuel crisis and a dodgy weather forecast. But this will hopefully go ahead next year! Another sad cancellation is our Regional Christmas lunch. There is just too much uncertainty to make booking viable as no-one is sure where will be open and whether the caterers will be able to operate. The final thing cancelled, which we have only just heard about, is the London New Year's Day Parade. This is always a great day out, but sadly not in 2022. You will see a piece in Bray Talk asking for people to express interest, but please now ignore it (but mark the date for 2023!).

I feel that there is a large portion of our eastern membership who are new to donkeys and the society and are coming forward to our training days to "meet other owners" just as much as to learn what and how to do things with their donkeys. I hope to address this by organising and helping other members facilitate informal and purely social events in the coming months and into 2022, with the aim of connecting owners and making a space to "talk donkey" without the structure of a training day.

We also had a demo on fitting fly rugs, everyone had a go at long-reining and then a short drive round in the arena (I hasten to add the arena was a very safe place and this was using a very well trained donkey). I think it's fair to say several people got the bug!

Getting to know you - this time it's Diana Dunstan



How long have you been involved with donkeys and how did you get started? - A very dear family friend, Fred Pearson, bought a field and asked me how to find some donkeys to put in it. I jokingly suggested looking in the yellow pages, not really expecting anything.... but there under Donkey Keepers and Breeders, was the Sandon Saddlery Donkey Stud. We booked a visit and very quickly two grey mares arrived along with lots of advice from the stud manager, Joan Howard - Carter. Inevitably the mares went back to stud in due course and as a result produced two beautiful foals, one brown, one grey. We caught the showing bug and went to many shows. I bought the brown foal in the autumn. Apsley Minstrel and I did all kinds of things, and he was wonderful and frustrating by turns. He had a very overdeveloped sense of humour, and delighted in making his handler/rider look foolish. His favourite pastime was bringing in the harvested hay, and he was expert at stopping in the right place for unloading. So I first became involved with donkeys in 1977 , and here I am still , a DBS member since 1979.How many do you have, and what do you do with them? - At the moment I have twelve, and they do all sorts of things! Several take part in the ADA scheme, and do nativities, Palm Sunday parades, school visits, and are ridden or driven. But probably my biggest interest is the show ring. The two oldest donkeys who are Solace aged 30 and Amos aged 31 are retired and live a pampered life in a small paddock at the back of the house, where I can keep an eye on them!

What has been your best moment (or several moments) with your donkeys? - That's a difficult one! I have been very fortunate to have the opportunity to drive Amos on three separate occasions in the main arena at Burghley Horse Trials, as part of the DBS donkey driving display. I have also driven him (in pouring rain) down the Mall after one of many appearances in the London New Years Day Parade. But I think that the best moments have been seeing four of my grandchildren winning the Junior Rider Championship at the DBS Supreme Championship Shows, mostly riding Amos, but one rode our coloured donkey, Cody. Two more granddaughters are waiting in the wings, so who knows!!!

Do you have other pets?- I have a piebald cob called Soloman, who is the gentlest horse I have ever known (and he loves the donkeys). We have geese and chickens too. But the head of the four legged family is definitely our seventeen year old Siamese cat Tomasina, who rules her subjects with a rod of iron, and keeps us all on our toes.

You – family etc? - My long suffering husband John, who on the quiet is very fond of our long eared family, especially Tansy. He specializes in creating eccentric looking muck heaps helter skelters being the best. We have three children, who have all been junior members in the past, and six grandchildren, four of whom have been juniors too. (The youngest is two years old and is already a dab hand at mucking out!)

What else do you do in the wider DBS? - I am on the Shows and Judges committee, and am Shows Administrator. I send out the DBS rosettes to the show secretaries, and collect all the results sheets which are used to calculate the winners of the various DBS showing awards. I am also on the Education and Youth Committee.

Top tip for donkey owners (or best advice you were ever given)? - Have patience with a donkey. Take your time to introduce new activities and tack and be prepared to do things little and often. Once you have a donkey's trust, they will do anything for you.

Any big plan for next year?- Fingers firmly crossed...... get out to some shows!!

PRECIOUS GIFT. Joss Goodchild

I now know that twelve months in the life of an (unexpected) donkey foal flies by in the blink of an eye. Peppercorn gave birth to Gift on 5 July 2020 with minimal fuss, despite being only a 3 y.o. herself.
